Connecticut has an Environmental Justice law in place already, but it is not doing enough. Clean air and water should not be considered luxuries, yet every day marginalized communities are disproportionately affected by environmental hazards and harmful pollutants.

I plan to continue my work at the state level to combat climate change and to ensure Connecticut is a leader with regard to environmental protection. It is imperative that we leave our earth cleaner and safer than we found it.
